


Treasurer's Report: No report. Michael Mason announced he had just paid lifetime dues.

Publications: Children's Recommended Reading List: Anne Morrell said the latest edition would be printed for LOSCON. Recommended Viewing List: Charlie Jackson 2 reported. Adult Recommended Reading List: Michael Mason was working on formatting.

Copyright Registration Clinic: Francis Hamit said he had taken it upon

himself to cancel the co-sponsorship of the National Writers Union, who hadn't responded with the help he requested. He still feels the workshop is something that we want to do. He wants to pick a date when he's not at risk of being snowed in at home. Looking at the calendar, Karl suggested a tentative date of March 29, 2003.

Video Library: Charles Lee Jackson II now has a new spreadsheet for keeping track of video materials. In December there will be an amnesty for missing items which there is no record of being checked out, then in January he'll decide whether to replace the missing items. Bill Ellem, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved a vote of thanks to Elayne Pelz for producing the spreadsheet. The vote passed by voice, unopposed, Elayne abstaining.

LOSCON 29: Tadao reported the con has 571 members. Room nights are creeping up. GoH arrangements are taken care of. The web site has been updated.

LOSCON 30: Michael Mason has selected various guests of honor: Saberhagen, Harvia, Chalker.

LALACON: Tadao is shooting for June 2003. His co-chair will be Ed Green.

Closed Session: Joe Zeff requested a closed session. Then we reopened.

New Business: Charlie Jackson 2 asked if LASFS wanted to send out a holiday greeting card this year to businesses the club uses and various friends of the club. Joe Zeff moved to appropriate \$75 for Charlie to issue a LASFS Holiday Card. Dingaling over squeak squeak. Charlie also suggested the LASFS answering machine needs replacing. The microphone records the squeal of the spindles as the tape turns. There was a discussion of why we didn't already use a digital one - had only found ones with 15 minutes of memory. Other alternatives were suggested. The directors voted to ponder the question for another month.

Chairman Karl Lembke called the meeting to order. He thanked the outgoing directors, Mike Glycer and Elayne Pelz. Joe Zeff asked that somebody send Elayne an appropriate note since she wasn't present.

Minutes: Glycer's minutes were distributed. Liz Mortensen noted that some of the business transacted at last month's meeting had also been passed three months ago. The Board deemed this to be a defect in the minutes which they approved as corrected.

New Members: Applications were received from Carla Rose Anastasio, Michelle Pincus, Kenneth Dodds and Kevin Dodds. Karl said the latter two applicants involved nepotism, because the root of the word refers to nephews. And they are his. Ed Green, seconded by Mike Glycer, moved to accept all applicants into membership. The motion passed by voice vote, unopposed.

Treasurer's Report: The treasurer's report is available from the treasurer.

Facilities: Bob Null reported on the installation of the rain gutters. He also observed that the back building bathroom needs work. Karl will coordinate with Donahue about that because a couple of new members have a father who is a handyman and might be able to do some of that work.

Furniture: Karl said benches have been purchased. Bob said they need to work on the anchoring. Liz said there is \$100.00 left of the amount appropriated for the benches.

Cleanliness Is Next To Ed: Ed Green discoursed on the unacceptable levels of mess and filth plaguing the clubhouse. He felt it was appropriate for him to lead the solution. Publications: Children's Recommended Reading List: No report.

Adult Recommended Reading List: Michael Mason said the new version is finished.

Copyright Registration Clinic: Karl reminded that it is on March 29, 2003.

Library: Michael Mason said the library is temporarily not accepting donations until it catches up.

Archives: Fred Patten explained a recurring problem of inaccurate historical lists in LOSCON publications despite his repeated efforts at correcting them. Marty Cantor suggested the club appoint a LASFS historian. The directors consulted the LOSCON archivist Tadao Tomomatsu, clarifying this was not a responsibility he was accountable for. They also discussed that due to the autonomy of LOSCON committees, it would not be appropriate for the Board to appoint a historian and declare him an automatic member of those committees. Ed Green, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to create the Board-appointed position of LASFS Historian. Its responsibilities would include updating LASFS and LOSCON history, and keeping current the lists needed for LOSCON program books. In the discussion, Bill Ellem suggested organizing the archivists under the Historian. Ed Green disagreed, feeling that would create friction when the archivists are already doing their jobs wonderfully. Karl restated the final form of the motion. It would create the position of LASFS Historian, a Board appointee who would be responsible for the accuracy and availability of historical material. The motion was passed by voice vote, unopposed.

Marketing Committee: Arlene Satin distributed examples of LASFS documents created to market the club. She had guests packets prepared containing flyers, recommended reading lists, and other information sheets. The directors immediately fell to proofreading, until Mike Glycer complimented the committee for this impressive assortment of documents, and Ed Green said Arlene needs another vote of thanks.

LASFS.org: Joe Zeff drew attention to errors on the latest version of the Board e-mail bounce.

LOSCON 29: Tadao reported the con had 1300 warm bodies, over 1400 members. Everybody seems to have had a good time. They are working on the pass-on issues. Michael Mason moved to commend Tadao for a wonderful LOSCON.

LALACON: Tadao said Lalacon 9 will be called Lalacon's Eleven.

LOSCON 30: Michael Mason said they sold 257 memberships at the con. They filled a bunch of committee positions at the San Diego SMOFcon.

LOSCONS OF THE FUTURE: Christian McGuire said LOSCON 30 will be the last at the Burbank Hilton under the current contract. He had solicited 5-year contracts from hotels and presented three proposals to the Board, from the Sheraton (at LAX), the Burbank Hilton, and the Marriott (at LAX). There was extensive discussion of the rates offered, and of the implications of moving the con to the airport area, as well as the drawbacks and advantages of keeping it at the Hilton. In the end, the directors cast 8 votes to accept the Marriott contract and 1 vote to stay at the Burbank Hilton. Mike Thorsen's proxy abstained.

The meeting adjourned following a motion made by Mike Glycer and seconded by Mike Thorsen's proxy.

LASFS CLEANUP, AUCTION & LIBRARY DONATIONS, AND THE APA-L ROOM

During the next few months the club is attempting to get itself in enough order so that the members do not have to continue to flatten themselves under a steamroller to get thin enough to be able to move through our buildings.

Therefore, as the Library has had to clog its aisles to move in books from the lounge, it is temporarily not able to accept donations at the present time. Please do not die and leave your books to the library until we are finished. If this conflicts with your present plans, please see the librarian about delayed donations.

The amount of material donated for auction is threatening to outnumber our members. Please, *please*, see Tadao before you bring in any more material for auction.

People are bringing paper into the APA-L room and doing printing. If you bring in your own paper for printing, please take it home with you after the printing is finished. This applies even if your printing job is large and requires several days to complete. Any paper found on the counter, in one of the printers, or any other place in the room, will be considered a donation to either APA-L or LASFS and will be cheerfully accepted as such. If you need to store paper in that room, do not just leave it there. See Marty Cantor and he will attempt to find a place for it. The days of Just Leaving Stuff in the APA-L Room are over and the attempt is now going to be made to keep that overcrowded small room neat enough so that there will be room for people to actually Do Things.

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as “egoboo” – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in fandom.

WASSAMATTA U. (Randy Byers, editor & author, 1013 North 36th, Seattle WA 98103; e-mail to rbyers@u.washington.edu; available to promote Byers' TAFF candidacy – but send at least a dollar to cover the postage)

One of fandom's unique traditions (starting in 1953) is the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund which exists “for the purpose of providing funds to bring well-known and popular fans familiar to those on both sides of the ocean across the Atlantic” to a major convention – the Worldcon, if possible. The TAFF alternates, bringing overseas fans to the U.S. and then sending U.S. fans abroad – usually to the U.K. The fan who is thus funded is one who has won an election and after he or she wins and takes the trip, the winner takes over the administration of the fund from the previous winner on the same side of the Atlantic. There is also the tradition (unfortunately honored as often as not in its breach) of writing and publishing a trip report. These are known as “TAFF Reports.”

Fans become well-known and popular and familiar to those on both sides of the ocean largely via written communications – fanzines and the Internet newsgroups and e-lists which have grown up over the past decade.

This year the candidates for the trip to the U.K. are three Americans and one Canadian, all of whom are known and liked and capable. They are Randy Byers, Colin Hinz, Mike Lowrey and Curt Phillips. I will be happy with whomever wins. But Full Disclosure requires me to admit that I am one of Randy Byers' nominators.

And Randy has done something I'd like to see all TAFF candidates do: He has published a collection of his own fan-writing, covering a full decade of work. *Wassamatta U.* is a 36-page fanzine, very simply but attractively designed by carl juarez (who is one of those guys who doesn't want his

name capitalized), containing 13 of Byers' pieces, plus an introductory "editorial."

"In the short term – such as it is – this collection is a promotional tool for my 2003 TAFF campaign," Byers states in that editorial. "I thought that voters might be interested in a sampling of my writing to help them make up their minds one way or another. ...There are a couple of con-reports here that should give you an idea of what my TAFF trip report would be like. I think you'll find my writing full of fantasy, good humor, and near-hallucinatory levels of bewilderment, but grounded in a terse, sweaty fear of love and death. Just the qualities one looks for (and finds) in a TAFF candidate, I'm sure you'll agree."

There's a lot of excellent writing in *Wassamatta U*. Byers tells strange tales of encounters with fans and ruminates on what "fannish" really means. He reviews a book (Gwyneth Jones' *North Wind*) and considers a proximate death. He wends words in personal but meaningful ways. *This* is what fanwriting is all about. If TAFF didn't exist this would still be one of the top fan publications of the year.


