The meeting was called to order at 11:16.

**Minutes:** November minutes were approved as presented.

**Treasurer:** We have money.

It is time to review the bids for cleaning services and make a decision about the 2007 provider at next month's meeting as the current agreement expires at the end of January.

Insurance is coming up for renewal and there is some research being done as to whether we can get better rates.

There was some discussion of who, if anyone, should respond to a letter from a fan complaining about an issue he encountered at Anime Expo. Elayne Pelz volunteered to explain to this person that LASFS is not associated with Anime Expo and has no influence on any of their actions.

**New Members:** Tamar Gandy of Los Angeles, CA, Betty Schulman of Culver City, CA, and Patty Kim of Redondo Beach, CA were accepted for membership unanimously. A little later, Tom Hegdahl of Forest Falls, CA, Brenda White of Hawthorne, CA, Karen Connell of Nuevo, CA, Richard Man of Palo Alto, CA, and Chris Woolrich of Palo Alto, CA were also accepted unanimously.

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**Facilities:**

**Parking:** There was some discussion of the western neighbor's posting of their parking spaces with "You Will Be Towed" signage, and what our response might be. This broadened out into a general discussion of neighbor relations, parking, and easements. The possibility of re-signing our own parking spaces was brought up, as well as the printing of LASFS member stickers to give out to members. Mention was also made of the abandoned car that has been parked in front of the club for the past couple of months. It was mentioned that L.A. County has a number to call specifically for abandoned cars (1-800-ABANDON, or just dial 311). Tadao volunteered to call the abandoned car number. It was decided that the nuts and bolts of implementation would be moved offline. The motion to send delegates forth to fix the parking spaces was approved.

The eastern neighbor requested permission to use our signpost to place a sign for his dental business. After some discussion, it was moved that permission be denied. This motion passed unopposed.

**Furniture:** 22 of the new folding chairs have been donated. There are 6 more in the pipeline.

**Electronics:** There is the need for some re-wiring and re-cleaning/organization of the A/V cabinet, as it has descended into chaos since the last organization foray. The potential reversal of entropy was taken offline.

The subject of sewing a new light shield was brought up and Elayne volunteered to do the sewing if provided with measurements.

**Computers:** We are in need of valid XP installations for the three new computers. There was some discussion of the best place to get them and a place was mentioned that provides discount software to non-profits. Research is being done and it was moved that budget be approved for the purchase of licenses. The motion passed.

**Marketing:**

Several people had filled out membership applications at Loscon, despite being far enough away that they would not be attending regularly. We were glad to take their money (and see second batch of new memberships above).

As usual, the third Wednesday of the month was the Marketing Committee meeting at the clubhouse, starting at 7:30.

There were articles in a couple of local papers (Daily News and Daily Breeze) about Loscon as a result of the NPR piece recorded at Worldcon airing the week of Loscon. It was suggested that we obtain the proper permissions from the papers to post or link to these stories on the website.

**Gestetner:** Was working fine at Loscon.

**Website:** Is working and is being improved.

It was mentioned that a website has popped up at loscon.net, which is a gaming organization of some sort. The Board is considering if any action is necessary to protect our trademark on the name "Loscon".

**Library:** Inventory is proceeding apace. After finishing inventory, the library will once more be able to accept donations. Said donations can be no more than a single box of books at a time and must be made by appointment with either the librarian or the Board liason to the library (Elayne Pelz).

There have been ongoing problems with books drifting out of the library and being scattered about the club premises.

The subject of re-keying the building was raised, as library staff have been coming in and finding the library open with no official library keyholder on premises. The discussion of re-keying was tabled until the January meeting, as was the discussion of library acquisition policy.

**Loscon 34:** Proceeding to schedule. there were 299 advance memberships purchased at Loscon 33.
