Vice President Greg Bilan Star Trekked in meeting #3821, of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, called to order at 20:09.

Committee Reports: The Emperor summoned his Lovely Assistant to pass the Lantern O'Jack. He announced the Winter Holiday Party, taking place on 12/25.

Jerry Pournelle reported on dead satellites walking. He first explained Lagrangian points. A pair of space craft that were supposed to be dead are flying to the moon. Patron Saint, Bill Rotsler: Jerry: Wish you were here. Milt: he was a very prolific fan cartoonist. He could do a completed cartoon faster than Milt can sign his name. He was also a sculptor, a photographer, a naked lady photographer, he got a Hugo for Patron of the Arts and sold many words to men's magazines, Hare Hobbs: When Playboy was first getting started, Bill published one of his SF stories in it, along with a number of articles and cartoons. 
And we have a sad item, which deserves to be singled out from the other items. We’ve lost a member of the club, and an active member of the society for 64 years. He was a friend to everybody, a father figure to some, has been one or another officer on any number of occasions, and helped create Boucher-Con, of mystery fandom.

Len Moffatt, 1923 – 2010. He passed due to complications from an annectomy 64 years ago.

We’ll take a couple of minutes for others to say something, and we’ll have a memorial in January so everyone can have their say.

George Mulligan recalls Len and June have been a part of this place forever. He also remembers Bouchercon 22, one of the best conventions he’s ever worked at or even attended. Milt Stevens called Len his oldest fannish friend, whom he met at the first LASFS meeting he attended. He’d been a fixture of the club even then, all the way back to 1947. Hare Hobbs notes there are people who have always been here. Bob Null was one, and Len was another. And they’re all starting to disappear. He learned the history of the club from Len.

Marty Cantor was fortunate at one time, he convinced Len that he should write his fannish autobiography. He didn’t start from when he began in fandom, but from when he came out here. It’s time to dig those out again and compile them into a small booklet.



CLJII: Len was one of those who came to LASFS briefly, passing through town on his way to an all-expense paid tour of the South Pacific at Uncle Sam’s expense. He was in Saipan, practicing for the invasion of Japan when word came that Japan had surrendered. Joe Zeff believes he had a number of SF short stories published in a number of magazines.

Marty: He went in on the occupation of Japan, and was stationed in Nagasaki. He was a corpsman medic, and was not supposed to treat civilians. He and the other medics did what they could anyway. Schirm remembers him as a very friendly presence, and admired his sense of humor. Tom Khamis interviewed Len and June at their home a decade ago, noticed that out of everyone from the 30s and 40s, Len was the only one who attended consistently with no breaks. Why you? You go where your friends are.

Arlene got to know Len and June while programming for LOSCONs and the like. They never said “don’t put me on this” – just put us where you need us, only make sure it’s in the morning so we can get home to bed. CLJII, on behalf of Ed Green: They pretty much adopted him, and made him one of their fannish children, to his gratitude. At a later date, he will probably have more to say.

For Len Moffatt, we had a full minute of silence. Even the soda machine was silent during the interval.

The **Menace** were read and accepted as “Worry a lot”.
