One of his stories was made into a movie, The Musquite Kid Rides Again. Bjo was a dance hall girl, Ron Ellik was Ray Ballard, Jack Harness was editor of the Corflu Creek Gazette, and Ernie Wheatley was the villain, assisted by Bruce Pelz and one other. The film is lodged in the time capsule known as the Trimbles' Garage. **Patron Saint, Lee Jacobs**, was given three cheers, and "dead silence".

Registrar Michelle announced a new member, Chuck Erickson. And Alan Hawkins.

David Okamura announced a very long **Moment of Science**. Scientists at the University of Hawaii found a planet still in the process of formation, 450 ly away. The German satellite has fallen in the Bay of Bengal.

Meeting #3873 of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society was called to order at 20:07.

The **Menace** were read, and Mike Stern paid \$2 to name them "Approved by the dark tentacle emanating from the pool in the northeast corner of the room".

Patron Saint, Bill Rotsler, was honored. Scratch: Bill Rotsler was a man of many talents, and had a phenomenal ability to have young lovelies wearing not much around them. Jerry Pournelle: He was a porn photographer for God's sake! Hare Hobbs: There was a time when Rotsler was ghost writing Tom Swifts. By Contract, he couldn't autograph them, so when his cousin John came up and tried to get one autographed. Rotsler drew a cartoon inside the cover and autographed that.

Marty Cantor; Rotsler was a gentle man, contrary to his photo on APA-L. He was a master of the simple line. More than any fan artist he can think of. He'd sit there and talk to you and he'd be drawing. When Bill Rotsler died, Bill Warren, who was very close to him, went through Rotsler's house and gathered up all his stuff. Rotsler had thousands and thousands of illos. Warren couldn't get rid of them all, so he gave them to Marty and he's been using and distributing them to other fan-eds. There's so much original art going out he could still qualify to win a fan artist Hugo. He did win the retro-Hugo and a Patron of the Arts fiction Hugo.

At the 2006 Corflu, and by pre-arrangement, Marty was the last person on the program. He got up and said a few nice things about Rotsler. And one last thing, he had two thick envelopes of Rotsler illos. "Anybody who's interested..." and he dumped thousands of illos on the table. There was a rush to grab them. Mike Stern didn't know Bill very well, but he did get a chance to talk to him a few times. He was very easy to talk to. If you sat down to chat, it was like you'd known each other for years. The first thing Mike said to him was "Bill Rotsler, I know that name. You're a Playboy photographer!" he was. Hare

And some of his photos, and some of his articles, and some of his SF stories.

June Moffatt remembers the banquet at the Odyssey. Rotsler got there early, and by the time everyone else got there, every bread plate had a cartoon on it. They offered to buy the plates from the restaurant. Milt Stevens remembers the Francisco banquet. Philip K Dick had a paranoid attack and didn't show at the banquet, so Bill Rotsler played the part. Jerry Pournelle: He had a habit of sending his friends cards, but they weren't Hallmark. They were his design and were not open cards. They had to be delivered in a plain brown envelope. Rotsler surrounded by 25 naked women and the caption read "Wish you were here".

He was a good man. Mike Stern says he was in the navy in WWII. He didn't look old enough to be in that war. CLJII: Think of all the wonderful things Rotsler could have done with his life if he hadn't wasted that hour drawing cartoons. **Patron Saint, Bill Rotsler**, was given three cheers, and "and a beautiful girl".

Registrar Arlene announced a distinct lack of guests.

Patron Saint, Francis Hamit, was honored. Hare: He brought the Red Cross in to teach CPR. He also fought for laws to make sure authors were paid when their articles were published on the web. He's a nice guy. He wrote a book on virtual reality, that's obsolete by now, and *The Shenandoah Spy*.

Jerry Pournelle: Francis was a nonfiction writer/ journalist. He published 300 articles. The profession owes him for getting a judgment forcing libraries that had been putting everything online without copyright to pay for the work.. He always wanted to be a fiction writer, but *The Shenandoah Spy* is quite a readable book. Francis is a knowledgeable chap. Sometimes he doesn't know as much as he thinks he does, but he's a good person to know. Matthew Tepper: He's one of the few LASFS members who's written plays that have been performed.

Scratch: "We're both Vietnam vets. I'm Navy, he's not. And he has a housemate who is also a LASFS member. she's ex Army. Leigh has been able to focus Francis on getting things done. For that she deserves a Sainthood." Francis Hamit was given three cheers and a virtual cheer.

David Okamura announced a **Moment of Science**. The NASA observation satellite was successfully launched. A Russian supply ship has docked with ISS. Manned flights will resume soon. The Chinese have been busy. They have launched their spacecraft which docked with their module in space. Apparently, it docks itself. // Boeing is setting up shop at the Kennedy space center, developing their 7 astronaut vehicle. // Earth has reached 7 billion. (*Rasbuckniks? As tronauts? Zits?* - ed.)

Tesla has announced it's going to make a profit, and seems to want to avoid increased scrutiny following Solyndra. // They have found a 3-eyed fish in Argentina, in a lake fed by water from a nuclear reactor. Doh! // Scientists have found a prehistoric squirrel like marsupial.

Jerry Pournelle discovered this book when John DeChancie and he were panelists at WeHo Book Fair – MagicNet. It comes in hardback or paper, or you can probably buy one directly from John. MagicNet was written in the 90s and projects a combination of magic and the Internet that's surprisingly still a good story. More of the capability came from magic than tech, but he didn't do a bad job of projecting magic into it to make it do what it does now. It's an interesting story, combines classical fantasy magic with some hard SF. It also has two interesting characters in a location on Coy Drive in Sherman Oaks – Ellison Wonderland. Harlan and Susan Ellison appear in the story. Harlan's actually not objecting to how he's portrayed. (*This is an interesting review of a book whose name was not recorded by the scribe.*— ed.)

Treasurer: We don't have money. Don't spend it. The Committee to leave now moved to adjourn. It was seconded, and we adjourned at 21:02.


Meeting 3877, December 1, 2011
