President Marty Cantor called the meeting to order at 8:01 PM, with Scribe Gavin Claypool at his side.

President Cantor announced the passing of author Katherine MacLean on September 1 in Portland, Maine, age 94. She won the Nebula Award for Best Novella of 1971 for *The Missing Man*, which she later expanded to novel length.

John deChancie announced that Brad Linaweaver had passed away from prostate cancer on August 29, three days before his 67th birthday. Writer, political analyst, libertarian, Brad wrote (among many works) the Nebula Award nominee "Moon of Ice", four novels based on the *Doom* video game (with Dafydd ab Hugh), and three *Battlestar Galactica* novels (with Richard Hatch).

Nick Smith noted that this week (Sept. 1) marked the 144th anniversary of the birth of Edgar Rice Burroughs, first star-level writer in Los Angeles. The reason he started writing: he realized "that if people were paid for writing such rot as I read, I could write stories just as rotten." His first two novels, *A Princess of Mars* and *Tarzan of the Apes*, were published in 1912.

Nick also mentioned the passing of Terrance Dicks (84), screenwriter and novelist, who worked on *The Avengers* and *Doctor Who*. He had attended a number of L.A. Who conventions and met a number of local fan.

George McUrso announced that: Ronni Rubin has survived left hip replacement surgery. She's in the recovery unit; see him for contact information.

MINUTES

A MOMENT OF SCIENCE

Francis Hamit brought four items to the club's attention:

- (1) MIT and colleagues in Amsterdam are developing robotic boats ("roboats") that can form bridges autonomously. (*Will one of them be*

named Lloyd? - ed.)

- (2) The Arizona State University women's robotics team placed first among United States teams and third in the world in a robot submarine contest held last month in San Diego. The team was formed as part of the effort to encourage more diversity in engineering fields, due to the small percentage of women majoring in engineering, math, statistics, and computer science.
- (3) Scientists have detected evidence of a predicted magnetic field associated with a vast intergalactic bridge (*Also named Lloyd? - ed.*) of neutral gas that stretches 75,000 light-years between the Large and Small Magellanic Clouds.
- (4) Birth defects attributed to Agent Orange are being seen in grandchildren of Vietnam War veterans. (*Is not Agent Orange now President of the United States? - ed.*)

REVIEWS

George McUrso liked *Spawn*, now on Amazon Prime: compelling story, good art.

Christian McGuire reviewed *Rurouni Kenshin*. The anime was excellent for its time but is dated now. Set in the beginning of the Meiji era, a former samurai wanders about, atoning for his past crimes.

Deb Levin reviewed *Good Omens*, says everyone must read and watch; it's wonderful.

Francis Hamit reviewed *Carnival Row*, now streaming. Very deep, very rich. Co-created by René Echevarria (*Star Trek: Deep Space Nine*). Has a complicated history, it's fantasy *noir*—with pixies. He also reviewed *The Naked Director*, about the porn industry in Japan. Based on a novel about a real-life director, a second-rate encyclopedia salesman who becomes the top director in the field; he pushes the envelope a lot and often lands in jail. Not for the prudish.

A Moment of Science:

India's lunar lander Vikram seems to have suffered an unfortunate failure to achieve a soft landing on the surface of the Moon. The Indian space program lost contact with it a couple of kilometers up, while decelerating for a landing, so either the final deceleration didn't work, or something else failed in the attempt. The lander was designed to explore near the south pole of the Moon, where there are indications of underground ice. Mike Thorsen said that initial video suggests that it was accelerating downward.

Another extra-solar object is wandering into our solar system over the next few months, and this one is acting more like a comet...just not one from around here. Spotted first by an amateur astronomer from the Ukraine, C/2019 Q4 looks like an approaching comet should, but it's not in a solar orbit, and is coming in from almost 90 degrees off the ecliptic. It will pass through our solar system out beyond the Martian orbit, but will be moving slowly enough that scientists can observe it for several

months, unless it does something silly like hit one or more asteroids.

Yesterday was the 70th birthday of dinosaur artist and art publisher William Stout. He has worked for both Disney and ILM, and has done design work on many films, ranging from *Conan the Barbarian* to *Pan's Labyrinth*. He's a generous man who loaned production artwork to the museum exhibit I curated a while back.

Also, this week would have been the 135th birthday of author Gertrude Barrows Bennett. If you don't recognize the name, that's because she has been largely overlooked in modern times, but she helped create the genre of dark fantasy in the early 1900s, and was possibly the first woman to publish science fiction under her own name, in Argosy magazine. Her first sale was at the age of 17, and she continued to write under her own name and a pseudonym, Francis Stevens. Sadly, some of her stories were lost when a publisher went out of business after buying them, but some still exist, in print and online.

Sadly, longtime fan Bill Schelly passed away after a brief illness. He's one of the few people who managed to turn fandom into an academic and literary career, and so in addition to writing for fanzines for many years, he wrote a number of biographies of SF and comics writers, artists and publishers, and even one about a silent movie comedian. His books about SF writer Otto Binder and about Forry Ackermann's publisher, James Warren, are classics, but one of the other cool things he did was to document the history of comics fandom, to parallel the work already done by others about SF fans.

Tad went to Worldcon. It was his first overseas Worldcon, and his third overall. The con suite was in hiding [Elayne said it was on the 3rd floor of the hotel, and only had munchies]. 



