FANZINES

By Ted White

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and some-

times list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as “egoboo” – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzines below and broaden your participation in fandom.

THE KNARLEY KNEWS (Henry L. Welch, 1525 16th Ave., Grafton, WI 53024-2017; e-mail to welch@msoe.edu; available for trade, contributions, letters of comment or \$1.50 a copy)

The Knarley Knews is published bimonthly and the current (February) issue is #86. That tells you something right there: this is no fly-by-night fanzine. In some respects, one can say this fanzine is typical of many individually-edited fanzines, in that it reflects the personality, interests and friendships of its editor. But in reflecting a specific editor’s interests and milieu, it is also unique to that editor – in this case Henry Welch. Welch stands a little to one side of fandom’s major cliques and social structure, a self-professed anti-elitist, choosing his own personal path and friends – and for that reason his fanzine is perhaps an easier entry point for those new to fanzines. There are no secret handclaps and no inside jokes here.

But Welch puts plenty into the 24 pages of his fanzine: an editorial in which he talks about his life; a rather pugnacious fanzine-review column by the rather pugnacious Rodney Leighton; “Witchard’s Armagnac,” an idiosyncratic column by Gene Stewart; “Zazerath’s,” a review of Tad Williams’ *City of Golden Shadow* by Derek Miller; a meaty 13-page letter column; “Sue’s Sites,” a short editorial by Henry’s mother; and “Fanzines Received in Trade,” a one-page listing of fanzines received (with one-sentence descriptions) which occupies the inside back cover.

The whole thing is attractively published (double-columned computer-set type, photo-copied) with a scattering of art inside and a cover by Hugo-winning fanartist Teddy Harvia. If I had to use one word to sum up this fanzine it would be “non-confrontational.” Despite the presence of firecrackers like Leighton and Stewart, Welch keeps his fanzine down-home folksy and family-friendly.

NO AWARD (Marty Cantor, 11825 Gilmore St., #105, North Hollywood, CA 91606; e-mail to martyhoohah@netzero.net; available for “the usual” – trades, letters of comment, contributions – or \$5.00 a copy)

Marty Cantor used to publish a fat fanzine called *Holier Than Thou* back in the ’80s, but after dropping that title he started *No Award* a decade later. (The choice of title allows him to make the facetious claim that this fanzine has been

on every Hugo Award ballot for years.) A 30-page “genzine” (or generally-oriented fanzine), the latest issue (#8) is produced on a computer but printed by a modern Gestetner super-mimeograph which produces a look close to that of photocopying. The material is solid, with Milt Stevens’ review of Delaney’s *Dahlgren* taking top honors. There are columns by Thom Digby, Mike Glycer, and Len Moffatt (the latter’s a memoir of his life in fandom), an essay-length fanzine review by Joseph Major and a 7-page letter column, plus lots of little extra bits fitted in here and there. *No Award* hasn’t been around as long as *The Knarley Knews*, but despite a slightly fussy layout it is better-edited and offers more to its readers.

NICHEVO (Nic Farey, P.O. Box 178, St. Leonard MD 20685; e-mail to nicfarey@popfire.net; available for contribution, letter of comment, recommendation, editorial whim or \$3.00 a copy)

Editor Farey calls *Nichevo* a “fandomcentric genzine.” The first issue is dated November, and the schedule is quarterly, so the second may be out soon. Farey’s approach is typical of the more “fannish” fanzine editors. He describes “fandomcentric” as a “primary concern [for] fans, fanzines, fan funds, fan awards, conventions, local groups or issues of the day relating directly to fandom.” *Nichevo*’s contents page follows this policy by categorizing the contributions as “Editorial,” “Fanzines” (three separate pieces), “Fan Funds” (commentary on TAFF), “Feud” (editor Farey takes on a loud-mouthed critic of a fannish e-list), and “Fans” (a profile of TAFF-winner and British fan Martin Tudor). The writing is lively and provocative and *Nichevo* provides a good entry into this part of fandom.

Mike Glycer, the Once and Future Scribe

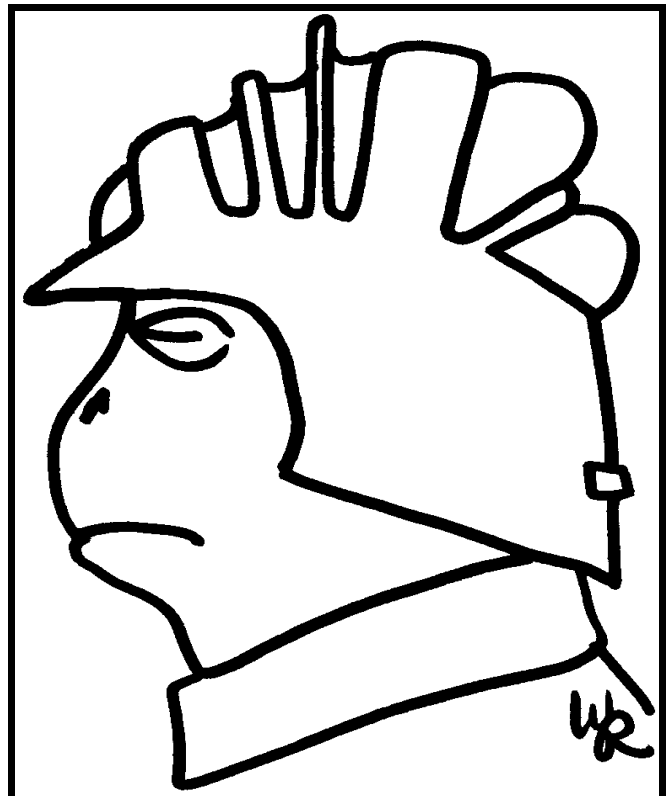

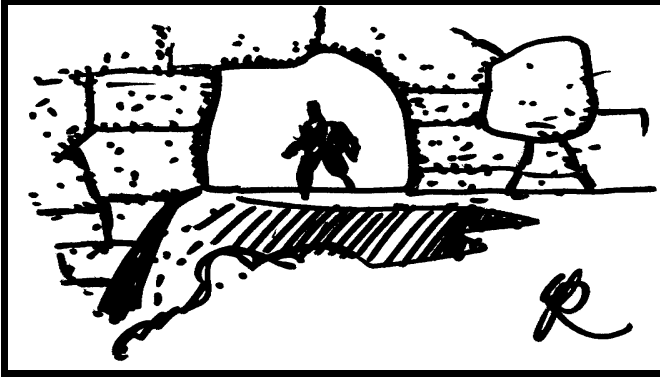

However, nobody knew what distracted Frank from realizing it had only moved three feet away from its original location. President Cathy Beckstead brought the meeting to order with another gavel customized by Bob Null (*from the Ministry of Silly Gavels - ed.*). Tonight's creation was made of four Tinkertoy wheels connected by curved plastic tubes, reminiscent of a 1950's diagram of an atom. Leigh Strother-Vien strolled through at the start distributing Avon catalogs. The product featured on the cover was bug-guard with sun block,

Marty Cantor announced the forthcoming 25th anniversary of LAS-FAPA, which will be celebrated by inviting all former members to contribute. Fred Patten was looking for a roommate for Westercon. Cathy asked, "At a thousand dollars an hours?" Fred would find that preferable to the arrangement we had at the 1973 Westercon, with about a thousand fans on the floor for a dollar an hour.

Registrar: Lynx was present, the guests were not.

Announcements: As a preamble to his story, Ed Green told the secretary to edit out all of the important stuff. Thank goodness he didn't tell me to edit our all the trivial stuff or else there would be blank space at this point. (*There still is blank space at this point. - ed.*) Suffice it to say, Ed's job duties took him to Tiffany's. But the snooty clerk thought he didn't look like the sort of person who would be picking up anything for anybody at Tiffany's. She told him, "You don't look like the kind of person who even comes in this store." Ed declared to us, "I have been kicked out of better places." Matthew Tepper felt Ed's pain, and urged him to sue, "But have your lawyer settle for having you served breakfast there." (I can hear the waitress asking, "Which one of you ordered the three-minute Faberge egg?")

Vice-Chair Karl Lembke chaired the meeting.

MINUTES: Glycer read the minutes. Joe Zeff corrected the mention of his comment, which had been that he suggested as an alternative asking whether the procedural officers - specifically, the registrars - would like to consult with the Board, instead of reporting to it (which is what Glycer had objected to.) Liz Mortensen corrected a mention of what she said about the Westercon I stuff - she said there was not a place secure enough. The minutes were approved as corrected.

TREASURER'S REPORT: As of January 11, 2001, the club had total assets of \$47,594.63. This included \$30,969.33 in the Century Fund. The treasurer's report was prior to paying for the plumbing. Liz said the DVD player has now been credited as a donation, and not charged against the video budget. Liz explained that the rationale for the previous system had been that if a donation was received for the video collection or library then it should free up money from that budget to be applied to another club need. However, as Ed Hooper repeated, then people feel if they donate, they are actually taking money away from something they want to support, which is the opposite of the result they want. Liz said she couldn't get her printer to produce copies of the Function Movement Motion. The motion was tabled until next meeting. Karl asked Glycer about the status of the audit. Glycer had requested the club's 2000 records on disc from Liz as the first step. Karl passed on Bill's request to Liz to get a list of the members who joined in the past two years. Liz said Elayne maintains that info. Liz had the year 2000 donation list. Glycer said he would generate the letters to donors of over \$250.

Liz called for a closed session of the Board. When it reopened, it was stated that Glycer would write to the donor of the piano acknowledging the donation.

NEW MEMBERS: Applications were received from Jay E. Moyes, Herbert Wright, Cash Edwards, Loren Wagner, John Cullan, and Bruce Rowen. The applications were approved by voice vote, unopposed. Karl asked that a copy of the membership applications find their way to the chair so he can send them letters of congratulation or condolence. He said Bill also wants copies of the guest cards.

BOOK FAIR: Greg Bilan recapped his needs for various flyers, and the plans for signings. Ed Green said the SFWA Nebula meeting is the same weekend as the Book Fair. Dangerous Visions, SFWA,

and LASFS have rented separate booths, pooling resources. LASFS will assist Dangerous Visions in hosting areas where authors can sign.

FACILITIES: Bob Null said after the last meeting he had taken six buckets of muck off the roof that was keeping it from draining (the cause of the leak in the computer room). The plumber had installed copper piping in the front building. They ripped out the Chinese elm, as we wanted. In an unexpected bonus, they also paved over what they dug up. Bob had subsequently fixed the toilet, removing the gravel which gets in the line when the plumbing is worked on. Bob reported on the neighbor's paving project. Karl asked about rain-water drainage after the work, and Bob said he would check. Bob said if there was a problem it could be fixed by building little asphalt sills around the openings under the building. (We wouldn't want our foundations undermined - if the first foundation goes, it will lead to an expensive Asimov reference.) Karl expressed the club's appreciation to Mike Thorsen for building the shelving in the computer room. And thanked Dale Hales for donating a shop vacuum. Karl asked Thorsen about shampooing the rug. Thorsen said we had hired it done last time. Mason suggested doing it as part of the cleanup party before LOSCON. Kim said that if we can get it done for around \$70 it will be worth it.

COMMUNICATIONS GROUP: Glycer said he is going to work on the club directory. Zeff would be working on a new e-mail directory. Marty Cantor said he would put the club directory through *De Profundis*. The Bandini hit the propeller. Kim objected to her info being sent out through *De Profundis*. Glycer observed how many other clubs he trades newzines with distribute their directories that way. Directors discussed whether to do opt-out or opt-in lists. Several people made practical suggestions for ways of notifying the members about our intentions and assuming we had the permission of anyone who failed to object. Glycer believed that if directors wanted a genuine opt-in list, that required people to actually write or e-mail permission to be included. Marty Cantor felt the Board should just vote whether it wants the list to go through *De Profundis*, instead of placing unrealistic burdens on getting the list updated. Christian McGuire suggested putting each person's info on a card for their approval, to put in an envelope and sent out with their copy of *De Profundis*, instead of placing unrealistic burdens on getting the list updated. Mike Stern, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to update the Directory and defer the sticky question until later. This passed by voice vote.

LASFS.ORG: Karl reported that from now on Chaz will have the title SysAdmin, and Karl will have the title Webmaster.

LOSCON 29 BIDS: Three prospective chairs - Greg Bilan, Mike Stern, and Tadao Tomomatsu - presented their bids to the board, then took questions. All three bids submitted the names of their chairs, treasurers, and hotel liaisons. Tadao went first. His LOSCON theme would be "Wag the Fan." Joe Zeff asked what that meant. Tadao's answer was to whip it out and wave it. Um, his fan, that is. Karl channeled Bruce Pelz' list of questions for prospective LOSCON chairs. Tadao handed out his multi-page resume of convention and professional work. Ed Green asked about Tadao's management philosophy. Mike Stern said he had been working up his bid for a couple of years. He wanted to run a LOSCON with the theme "Mirror Universe," inspired by the palindromic year 2002. Karl asked why he wanted to run a LOSCON. Stern said, "You mean, besides being insane?" He wanted to return something of what fandom has given him. Liz asked whether his LOSCON would be more media-oriented or literature-oriented. Stern prudently answered, "Yes." He answered Ed's question saying that he hopes to have a style of delegation, where he's not watching over people's shoulders. Greg Bilan said his LOSCON theme would be "Empire of Fantasy." He said he's always had more fun working the convention than simply being at the convention. He's always wanted to run one. Bilan talked about the different LOSCON departments he's worked at, about raising money for the club's Festival of Books booth. After further questioning, Mason, seconded by Kim, moved to pass all three bids on to the club. The motion passed by voice vote, with Mike Stern abstaining.

CLUB USE: Greg Bilan requested permission to hold a 4th of July party at the club. The party will be open to the club, but it will not be a club party. Stern, seconded by Glycer, moved to allow Bilan to hold the party. The motion passed by voice vote, unopposed.

LOSCON 28: No report.

FALA7CON: Tadao has added writer guest Brad Linaweaver.

LIBRARY: Mason commended his new assistant librarian, Lynne Baden. He said the proposed library inventory will be done after a work party, and when the new version of the software is done.

ARCHIVES: Bob Null said the *De Profundis* archive is ready to be gone through. As he'd mentioned before, it had an erratic numbering system, making it more difficult to determine what was missing. Glycer suggested comparing the club's holdings to Bruce Pelz' list of his own collection.

STEWARDSHIP GROUP: The directors discussed a change in accounting for donations of "stuff" to the club. Liz explained how non-cash donations are accounted for. When stuff is donated for auction, Tadao puts a post-it on the item with the donor's name. Scribe Glycer writes down the name of the donor and the name of the buyer on an auction worksheet. The credit for the proceeds goes into the operating fund. When stuff is given for the club's use, Bob Null gives a credit figure to her, and it is listed as a "paper transfer" - in under donations, out under expense - because there's no cash. Kim observed that the purpose of a budget is to increase what can be expended for a purpose. Liz noted the video and library are the only

two club functions that have a separate budget. Christian McGuire framed the issue as being whether a donation of stuff should free up budgeted funds for another club purpose. Joe Zeff agreed with those who felt that when somebody donated to the video collection or library, those functions should wind up with more than they had before, not less. Glycer moved and was seconded that the LASFS should account for donations-in-kind separately from department budgets. The motion passed by voice, with Liz abstaining. Karl called for status reports of various activities and groups that use the club. Karl brought up the matter of complaints by one group that a prior group using the club had not picked up after itself. Karl summed up the discussion that our policy is that each user should put things away to a default setup, and not assume, or hope, they may they have left things as the next group will want them. Cathy Beckstead said there needs to be specific requirements, a checklist. Glycer suggested the chair appoint people to assemble such a checklist. Ed asked who will inspect whether the checklist has been followed, and what will happen if users don't do what is required? Kim was sure the next group of users would complain if the list wasn't done, eliminating any need for inspections. Dale Hales said verifying compliance with a checklist should be the responsibility of whatever club officer unlocks the building for a user. Ed Green volunteered to assemble the list, and would coordinate with the janitors. He will draft it, bring it back to the Board for approval, then give it to the current President to deliver to the clubhouse users' liaisons.

The meeting adjourned.

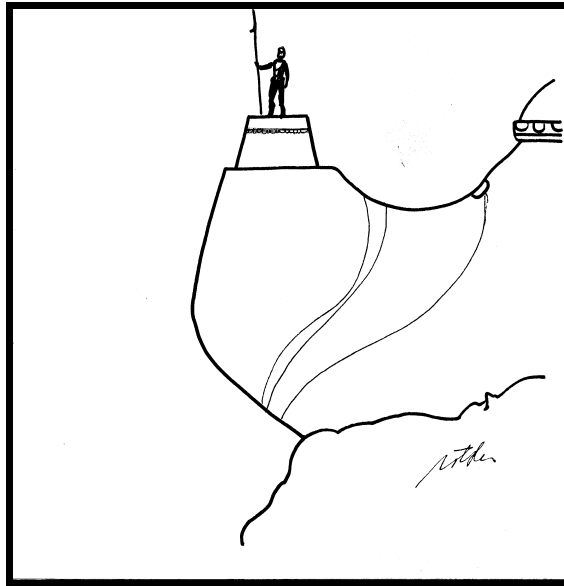
