Minutes: Glycer read the minutes. Ed Green, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to accept them as corrected. The motion passed by voice vote, unopposed.

He asked if anyone is responsible for keeping LASFS PR documents in stock and available.

Karl said he will talk to the marketing committee about this. He recommended the marketing committee talk to somebody about storage space.

Ed initiated an overall discussion of storage at the club, due to many piles of stuff stacked in the room. Then he asked Karl to put somebody in charge of space allocation, to sit down with parties and make these decisions. Michael Mason volunteered to be the Director of the Space Program. Elayne offered some filing cabinets to the club. Karl appointed Ed Green the First Space Cadet.

LASFS.org: Karl had fixed pointers within the LASFS web page to point to the main page, and the pointers on it would direct users to the current LOSCON page.

Karl said he hadn't worked on the e-mail redirect capability, though it remains possible. Ed, whose suggestion it had been, moved that Karl defer the work until the hysteria dies down.

Video Library: Karl read a report submitted by Charles Lee Jackson II. Library: Michael Mason said donation credit receipts are being given.

Karl handed out the draft "Standards and Guidelines of Performance" for the club librarians. The directors skimmed it. Glycer congratulated the committee for coming up with a draft in one month. The draft discussed how to dispose of surplus books, and Glycer suggested that be spun off into a separate proposal, to keep it from delaying acceptance of the actual performance guidelines.

Francis Hamit described how the copyright laws affect libraries, one positive aspect being that it allows them to make up to three copies of an archived book.

Elayne asked that Bill Ellem e-mail a copy of the document to the Board with the items that don't bear on the Guidelines pulled out.

The directors discussed how to deal with items in the collection that had been taped off the air, since Hamit's review of copyright law had pointed up that our library can't hold or circulate such items. Ed Green asked if someone would discuss this with Charlie, and Bob Null volunteered.

Elayne, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to distribute the Guidelines to the Board, Charlie Jackson II and assistant librarians, and bring it up again next month. The motion passed by voice vote unopposed.

Archives: Bob Null reported on what he had filed.

LOSCON 29: Tadao said the status is quo. He would hold a committee meeting this month. Mike Thorsen asked about the web page. Tadao said his webmaster and Chaz are working on acceptance of codes.

LOSCON 30: Michael Mason said: no new changes.

LALACON: Nothing new.

COMMANIA Greg Barrett said he doubted this was a good time to have it. He wasn't sure this is a good fundraiser for the LASFS. Ed Green moved to appoint Greg Barrett a committee to report when and if.

North Hollywood Neighborhood Council: Marty Cantor said on September 24 their neighborhood organization would come up for certification before the City.

New Business: Francis Hamit suggested that the club run a clinic for members and the public teaching them how to register their copyrights, so they can protect rights they have but without registration lack effective legal standing against copyright violators. Hamit was willing to teach it. Ed Green, seconded by Glycer, moved to empower Francis Hamit to do exploratory work to set up a copyright workshop, and determine how much to charge, etc. The motion passed by

voice vote, unopposed.

Marketing Committee: Arlene distributed samples of business cards created for the club and for “Arlene Satin, Media Relations Community Outreach.”

Shaun Crosby said the first press releases had been sent to KABC. He will get a news crew to LOSCON. Shaun’s car will be on display as an exhibit at ConJose, which will also be used for club publicity. They are working on defining how they will get the word out to media based on the distance of the station/paper/etc. from our event. And how to get it out to comic and book stores. They are working on masters of PR documents. Mike Thorsen had put together a not-for-air video showing what LOSCON is about. Ed commended the marketing committee as having improved 150%.

Cathy Beckstead said that everybody doing stuff for the club needs to know the contact information for the marketing committee. These guys are a resource and members need to be aware they exist. Ed Green suggested the marketing committee take program time at a Thursday night meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 1:03 pm and there was great rejoicing.

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans’ interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

FANZINE REVIEW

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as “egoboo” – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in fandom.

CHUNGA #1, Summer, 2002 (Andy Hooper, publisher; Randy Byers, editor; Carl Juarez, designer; no price listed, but send a buck for postage; mail to Byers at 1013 North 36th St., Seattle WA 98103; e-mail to fanmailaph@aol.com or rbyers@u.washington.edu or cjuarez@myrealbox.com.)

Chunga – the name comes from the Frank Zappa album of 1970 – is a solidly edited fanzine in the tradition of “genzines” (general fanzines, unspecialized in nature) which does not feel like a typical first issue. This is undoubtedly because the three fans involved in putting it out have, between them, decades of experience with fanzines. Andy Hooper’s *Apparatchik* was a major fanzine of the mid-’90s. At times he drew upon the assistance of Carl Juarez. And Randy Byers has been making his name as an important fanwriter since he wrote and published *Travels With Tami* more than a decade ago. Byers has also had his hand in several collaborative fanzines, but this is his first stint as editor of an ongoing genzine – the next issue of which is predicted to appear “sometime after the 31st of October, 2002.”

Within 26 pages Hooper, Byers and Juarez have done pretty much everything right – down to the little delights tucked away in the fanzine’s nicks and crannies. In addition to a page of editorials, there are eight articles and three facetious “Fanzine Reviews from Planet X.”

In her “Helicon Fanzine Blues,” a brilliant, multi-dimensional piece, Claire Brialey remarks on fellow British fan Lilian Edwards’ “theory ... that good fanwriting has to be by people you know; or, rather, that you appreciate an article far more when you know the writer, or you know where they fit in to your map of fandom, or when it enables you to get to know more about them. Sometimes, in fact, it makes you want to get to know them better in person. I think the main contention here is that good fanwriting is not only intrinsically part of the fannish community but that it also fosters a sense of community in its audience.” Claire subsequently offers “two qualms about accepting this,” but she has summed up an important aspect of fanwriting.

Chunga is full of good fanwriting – which, although doubtless enhanced by an acquaintance or familiarity with its authors, is good enough to stand on its own and covers a broad range. Lesley Reece rings the changes on an old Dr. Pepper commercial with “Wouldn’t You Like To Be A Latte, Too?” Randy Byers talks about fear of two different kinds in “Cliff Hangers.” Max (voted Best New Fan in this year’s FAAN Awards) contributes “Tobes for TAFF – What *Have* We Done?” Luke McGuff gives us two editions of

“Skiffy Corner,” in each of which he idiosyncratically reviews a SF book (by James White and by Samuel Delany). Hal O’Brien and Andy Hooper collaborate on “A Brief Interview” (political humor, which I cared for least). I’ve already mentioned “Helicon Fanzine Blues.” And Andy Hooper closes the issue out with “Never Forgets,” a reflection on zoo elephants.

Chunga is off to an impressive start and I look forward with some eagerness to its second issue.

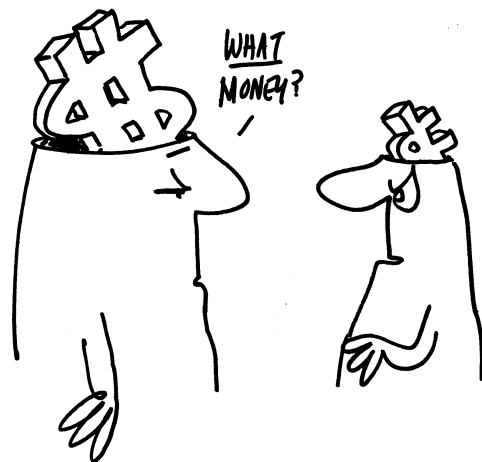

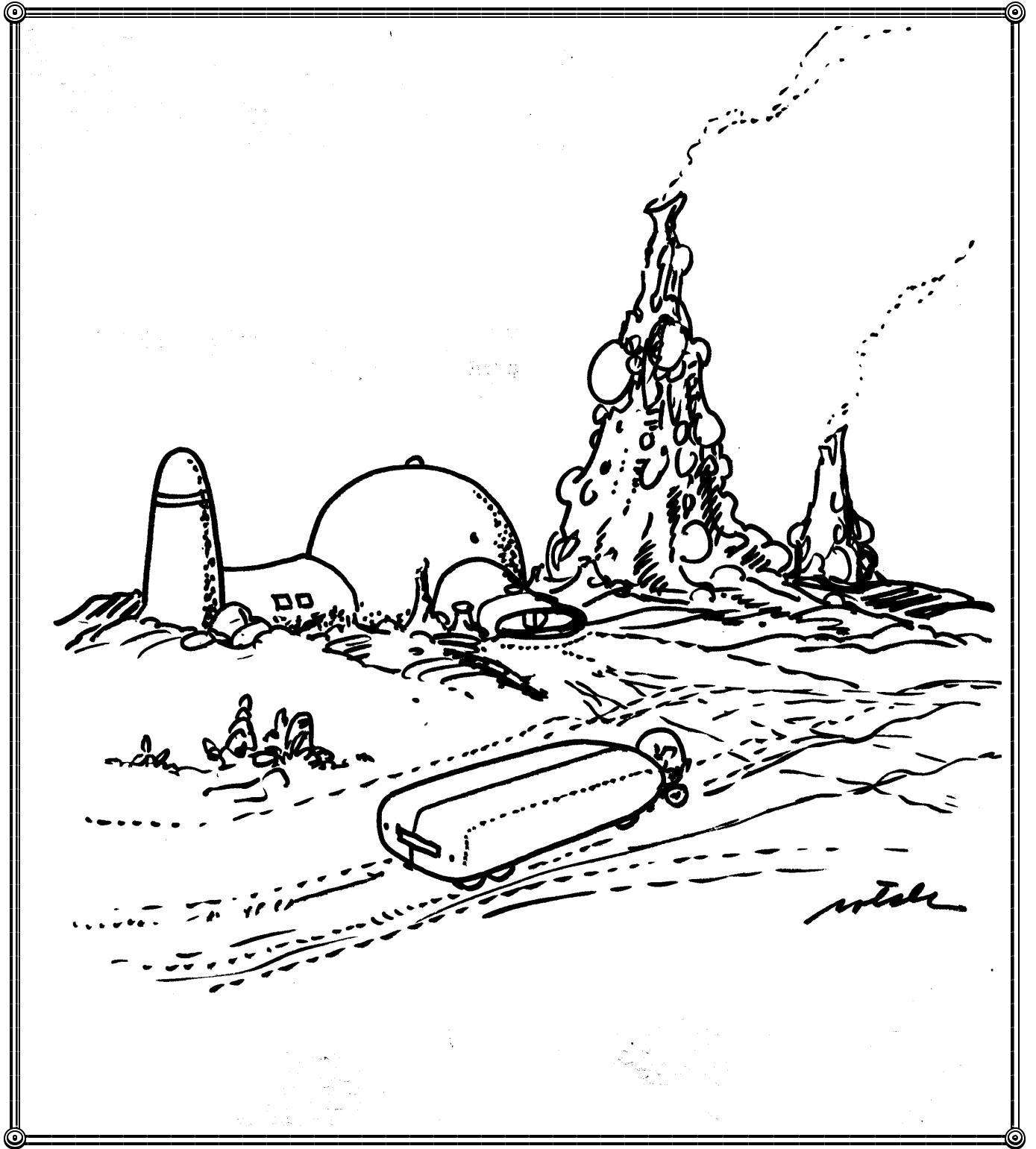

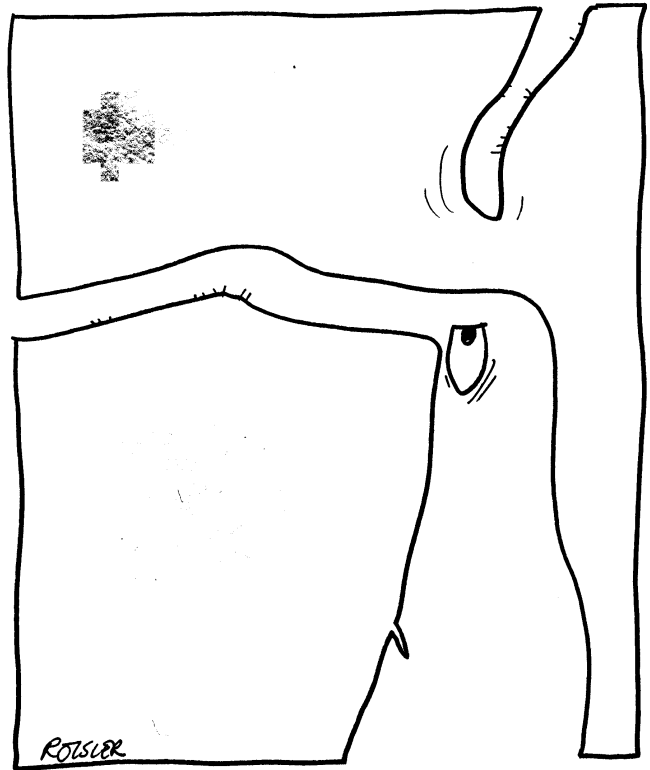
