Lepin's house. (1954 – 55) He and the other four plus Bjo Trimble plus a few others instituted the Silver Age of fanzine. They had a steady stream of fanzines coming out of the club. The group met almost every day of the week at Zeke's place, and then Bill took them out to supper. There were some pretty fantastic conversations at the Hawaiian Barbecue and several other cafes around. These wound up being in some of the fanzines. It was very creative, very enthusiastic, and a good time was had by all. It tapered off when Bruce Pelz showed up, in that they began to disappear into real life.

Dave's first effort was The Dagger Affair in which he read through a book of quotations, swiping everything that was a quotation to use for chapter heads. Dave was a good guy. He had a temper, which Bill knows because he restrained him in Berserker mode once. Dave was original when he wrote; he was intensely creative. He was one of those people who are missed.

CLJII: In his later years, Ted was his partner for projects. They produced Triple Doubles together. Dave was first and foremost a shooter and cutter. He was much better at that than writing. Writing for him was working out the details of the story, and putting it on paper was the part he liked the least. In order to get a finished book out of him, one had to ride herd on him. The first LASFS meeting Charlie attended, David McDaniel was an unexpected bonus. DAGGER stands for Destruction A Go-Go and Electronic Revenge. He also produced a Thrush training film. Last project was a Star Trek novel because he was assured they had an in. For those who read Amazing Adventures, that story was used in three pieces for a series set in the future. Last book, The Final Affair, was published privately. In one book, Monster Wheel, the first letter of the chapter headings spell out A A WYNN IS A TIGHTWAD. The books are in the club library and worth checking out.

With a farewell address, President Marcia Minsky called the ultimate meeting of her term, meeting #3907 of the LASFS, to order at 20:15.

The **Menace** were read, and Marcia Minsky paid \$1 to name them "Farewell Arms".

Patron Saint Fred Patten was honored. Scratch: He's the reason why Japanese Animation took off in this country. His enthusiasm started the fan base. CLJII: When he joined the LASFS, when he was a young man, somewhat younger than today, Fred was the guy who sold you comic books you couldn't read at prices you couldn't afford. They were in French (TinTin) and Spanish. Fred was always full of interesting stuff people didn't know about. A little later, Fred allowed his interest in Asian material to overflow, and the rest is history. For many years, Fred co-owned a comics related book store. One week, he invited Charlie to see a film with him, and then six days later had a stroke. He continued in APA-L for a while, but eventually did end his string. Marty Cantor: Fred started contributing to APA-L in issue number 1 and continued producing zines for each and every distribution (including several fractional issues) until he just could not continue (due to his stroke). Fred's last contribution was in disty 2280, thus ending a most remarkable string.

Milt: for years, he was the LASFS party vegetable. He'd show up at a party, find a book, and read until he fell asleep. The following week, he'd present a complete tran-

script of the entire party, including stuff in far away rooms and while he was asleep. Hare: According to his aunt, Fred's responsible for Hare going to the dark side. Aunt was a head of Filmation. Japanese Animation was a sin around her. He made the mistake of mentioning it around her, and found out in a hurry.

Karl: He's the official LASFS historian, and he demonstrated his flair for the dramatic by having the Stroke of Midnight. Tom Safer recalls Fred showing up at a number of his shows, and keeping him in C/FO. Marty: Anyone who does not know Fred: He was the gentleman in the wheelchair in the corner earlier this evening, and that was his sister with him. Jerry Pournelle recalls Fred for a slightly different reason. He once decided to publish Richard Delap's Science Fiction Review, a SF review magazine which had the potential to rival Locus or SF Review. He chose as the editor a man who decided that the most memorable review he'd write is one of the only two bad reviews of *The Mote In God's Eye*. It's also the only thing Jerry remembers about the magazine, more a reflection on Jerry than the magazine. Pleased to say it does not seem to have harmed the sales of *Mote*. Larry Niven met the editor of that zine, and the editor wanted him to see the review of *Inferno*. The reviewer couldn't find any metaphors. *Inferno* was the second highest earning SF book published by Simon and Schuster.

Patron Saint Fred Patten was given an Amazing Three cheers!

Patron Saint Alan Frisbie was honored. He is also the Sacred Flying Disc. Scratch: he doesn't show up often enough. He has a marvelous dry sense of humor. Last time Scratch saw him was at the B.G. Workman wake. Alan is a member of That Family. A number of years ago when Joe was scribe and a certain person was President, Alan was being noisy and told to go outside. Alan then had to be called back in, because it was his saint's night. Alan Frisbie is one of the few people in America who's been bitten by a wombat.

And lo, with a mighty roar in the night, meeting #3909 of the LASFS came to order! David Okamura paid \$2.50 to name the minutes, and generously donated the privilege to the scrappy spitfire serving as club scribe, one Elizabeth Carlie, who named them "I, Too, Have A Voice!"

Patron Saint Marc Schirmeister! Members of the LASFS share their memories and kind words about their fellow and friend... Milt said of Marc that his cartoons show up all over the English speaking world, in fanzines here as well as Britain, even in Australia. He suggested that someone nominate Marc for a Best Fan Artist Hugo Award. He's never been nominated, and it's a shame! David remarked that Marc took it on himself to redo the planters when the clubhouse moved. He waters, helped set up the irrigation system, and took it on himself personally, so everyone should have a look. Dr. Pournelle seconded Milt's vote to nominate Schirmeister for a Hugo, it's a damn shame he's never won it. He also said that Marc's taught him more about the history of film & animation than anyone, and given that he's forgotten a lot of it, he has Marc to remember and teach him all over again.

Marty Cantor met Marc back in the Seventies at the first clubhouse. He's very happy to use his art on covers for APA-L. Marc is probably the best fanartist who's never made the Hugo short list, and he really deserves it. Marty will use his work whenever possible, and hopes that when Marc gets the time, we'll get his work on the door to the print room. It's board approved, Marc just needs the time. President Tepper agreed that Marc's association with the club goes back to the early or mid Seventies. Once, Elliot Weinstein & Mike Glier & Matthew found some of his work and found themselves saying "Who is this guy?!" He does serious & silly with equal panache: everything from serious art based on the Lovecraft myths to silly galloping horses & dinosaurs. Marc even designed a float that was in the Rose Parade, representing the City of South Pasadena.

Joe Zeff also mentioned Marc's Rose Parade credit, and President Tepper added that Marc's offhand comments sometimes floor him with their humor. Once, while watching a cartoon with a bouncing ball singalong, Marc remarked out of nowhere, "Next week, we're going to sing Gregorian chants & follow the bouncing cube!"

Many people visited just for the Memorial, and those who knew him personally thanked us for our efforts.

The whole affair was videotaped, so that's being copied and sent to the family. Someone's also going to put that up on YouTube, with a link on the website. Big thanks go out to everyone who helped...clean up, set up, and Eylat for the potluck. There was lots of cooperation from all.

Matthew extended thanks to Arlene on behalf of the club, and sounded the Aetna parking warning. He went on to say that we were on Agenda Kind-Of-Light, so encouraged a completion of announcements.

MOMENT OF SCIENCE - DAVID OKAMURA: David spoke of concerns that parents are raising kids in too sterile an environment, making them more prone to illnesses because there's no exposure to dirt, and therefore no antibodies can be built to keep them healthy. A recent study says one way that's effective in inoculating kids? Pets! A dirty dog can be a child's best friend. Even house pets who stay indoors improve immunity in children, but there's marked improvement with outdoor pets who play outside and return with various forms of disease, bacteria, and so on.

In the same vein, there's evidence that cats carry similar disease...or rather, parasites, one in particular: toxoplasma gondii. It's a protozoan, and a cat is its optimal host. In fact, it can ONLY reproduce in in cat's intestines, though it infects other creatures. To return to its natural environment, it's been known to affect the brains of mice: it actually makes them run TO cats to encourage reproduction. The parasite attacks the part of brain responsible for sexual arousal. It's a bad day for mice, but a free meal for cats. When it eats the mouse, the parasite returns to native environment.

To that end, we have to ask: does this happen to us? Yes, 10-20% of Americans have this parasite thanks to litter boxes & undercooked meat. (*Uncercooked cats? I had a hunch that cats were food for something... - ed.*) A study in Denmark checked the infection rate & suicide stats in women, and found a marked increase in terms of schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, & suicide among those with this parasite. There was a 90% increase of attempted suicide in one instance. (*So, these people run to get eaten by cats? - ed.*)

REVIEWS: Milt reviewed WESTERCON, out Seattle way. There were few LASFSians, but attendance was just under 1000, the largest in 10 years. It was at the same hotel as NORWESCONS, they had one there about 10

years ago. The selection was different from cons down here.

Larry Niven gave a review of Ursula LeGuin's THE DISPOSSESSED...about 40 years late. He blamed her, it beat A MOTE IN GOD'S EYE for a Hugo, and he stayed mad about this long. It's very good, and an excellent character study. Ursula did her level best to deal with subjects interesting to Libertarians. It was a pure look at capitalism vs. libertarianism, something both science fiction fans and straight up libertarians can love.

MISCELLANEOUS: Hare Hobbs presented photographic evidence proving why clothing reviews are BANNED at the LASFS.

Arlene Satin asked everyone to pick up around them, clean up food in back, and wipe the table down. Also, please pick up chairs since Gregg Bilan isn't here to do so after programming ends. CLJII noted, just before we adjourned, that there's a bedbug infestation in this neighborhood: exercise caution! (*Betteer yet, exercise your indignation.* – ed.)
