Committee Reports:

Meeting 4114, June 16, 2016 President Gavin Claypool, presiding Nick Smith, Scribe

President Gavin Claypool called the meeting to order at 8:04 pm.

The **Minutes** of the last meeting were read and named, with \$3 from Tom Safer to name them The Waldo Minutes.

PATRON SAINT HARE HOBBS: President Claypool asked Hare to tell something about himself that he hadn't told the club. Hare said he didn't know anything he hadn't already said.

From the Hagiography: Longtime regular attendee, willing to share his love of music and books.

PATRON SAINT SANDY COHEN: Same question for Sandy Cohen. Sandy Cohen was the junior checkers champion of the state of Minnesota. [Elayne pointed out that she hadn't killed him in Prague.]

From the Hagiography: Sandy is the LASFS Sacred Chancellor of Chocolate and he invented a couple of LASFSian poker games. Sandy is a good art auctioneer and has contributed to many conventions.

A Moment of Science with David Okamura: Dave's not here, but some space news is.

SpaceX's streak of successful barge landings ended yesterday when a Falcon 9 booster suffered a "a rapid unscheduled disassembly" according to Elon Musk (Read: "BOOM!") But this was somewhat expected given the exceptionally high altitude the rocket had to attain in order to deploy two communications satellites, which were successful. And the last two barge landings also had low expectations. SpaceX says the apparent cause was low thrust in one of the three engines running at the time of landing (lack of fuel?), and upgrades will address this issue by the end of the year. In the meantime, SpaceX is planning an ISS resupply mission in July, with another land based landing attempt.

Elon Musk clarified some of his comments about launching to Mars. His goal is to establish that regular unmanned launches to Mars *can* be made on a scheduled basis, for the purpose of delivering scientific experiments and supplies for any future manned facilities on Mars. His 2025 goal is the earliest that he thinks such a manned mission could happen. He has also pointed out that the first manned mission to Mars will be risky business, and compared it to the early English colonies in North America, saying that we should be prepared for the probability that there will be fatalities. We can only hope that he was thinking of Jamestown rather than Roanoke. (*What did those colonists expect, landing on that horrible East Coast. Had they landed in Los Angeles they would have had a wonderful climate and they could have relaxed in paradise.* - ed.)

Meanwhile, the Indian Space Research Organization, India's equivalent of NASA, will be attempting to launch 22 satellites to orbit on a single launch vehicle next Monday. While both the U.S. and Russia have launched more at one time, this launch is part of India's goal to develop cheaper and more efficient launch technologies. This one launch will add almost 1% to the total number of operational satellites currently in orbit around the Earth.

In older news, 1.4 billion years ago two black holes collided, and we just now found out about it...luckily because they were that far away. The reason why it's news is that scientists were measuring the incoming data, which turned out to support Einstein's theory of how gravitational waves would work if they exist. This is the second such measurement in the last year that supports Einstein's gravitational theories, so don't try falling up.

Special Orders of Business: Francis Hamit has informed us of the passing of Rory Michael Riley earlier this spring. He was a longtime fan and the publisher of the 1990s magazine Star*Quest. He joined LASFS in 1994, around the time he was working on the magazine.

Oddly, the magazine itself was also a club member, according to club records. This short-lived semi-pro magazine included fiction, non-fiction and artwork by other LASFS members, including Ray Capella, Charles Lee Jackson II, Joe Zeff, Fred Patten, Mike Thorsen, and at least one article by some guy named Pournelle.

Announcements: The Bookstore of Mystery and Imagination in Glendale, 238 N. Brand, is continuing its 70% off sale, and expects to close the physical store by the end of July. The plan is to keep selling online and at special events, which is where they were making most of their money anyway.

Larry Niven and Jerry Pournelle have a ghost story sequel to Lucifer's Hammer in the new issue of Analog.

George announced the 100th birthday celebration of Forry Ackerman, to be held on December 3rd, here at LASFS.

Reviews: George reviewed a series of alternate history westerns by Mike Resnick, including an alternate version of the Gunfight at the O.K. Corral, and a version of the story of Billy the Kid. Geronimo and Theodore Roosevelt are in the 3rd book. Well-written, and they have appendices about the real history. George was the first person to read them from the LASFS library.

Patron Saint Hare recently read Stoker's Dracula, and compared it to the movie version, and noted that the movie doesn't start until about page 60 of the book. (*Well, if you watch the movie backwards, maybe you can get to the beginning of the book.* - ed.)

Milt finished the last of the Hugo nominated novels, Seven Eaves by Neal Stephenson. 1000+ pages, and the story involves the moon having been destroyed, and goes on from there, for many pages. About 2/3 of the way through, it gets interesting. After reading them all, he's voting for Naomi Novik's novel.

Ted Johnstone was a Pro who wrote stories under his real name (David McDaniel) and conducted his fannish life under the pseudonym *Ted Johnstone*. Ted was a fan of Dark Shadows and The Man from U.N.C.L.E. He wrote Man from U.N.C.L.E. novels plus one SF novel and several SF short stories.

He was a LASFS scribe, a filk singer and writer of filk-songs, and he teamed with Bruce Pelz as a singer, camera

man, and film editor. Ted worked on conventions and was part of Arson, Rape and Bloody Murder (Harness, Johnstone, & Pelz) and was the inspiration for James Wong Hound, alias David McDog, in Amazing Adventures.

Ted was a Fanzine editor and a very good storyteller.

The WHO has downgraded coffee from its status as a possible carcinogen, because it doesn't really seem to cause most cancers, but the temperature of the coffee can damage the esophagus, which is the real risk factor for esophageal cancer.

In Seal Beach, there are two things of which to be aware, sharks in the ocean and drones in the air. The drones are actually watching out for the great white sharks, which are coming back. A good thing may be coming back to bite us. The FAA is opening up more possibilities for using commercial drones. A British firm is training eagles to knock them down.

We haven't gotten enough rain and snow, and now they're estimating that drought recovery will take until 2019. The Sierra Nevada now has many dead trees, from the drought and beetle damage, so fire risk is unusually high.

We have now gotten more views of the galactic core and the black hole, but 1/3 of us can no longer see the Milky Way due to light pollution from where they reside.

The Juno probe will arrive at Jupiter on July 4th and Pluto may have some liquid under its icy surface.

The San Andreas fault hasn't moved laterally in our area in many years, but scientists are now trying to measure up-and-down movement. The measurement of this could be significant.

Minute of Science Without David Okamura:

The chemistry of the planet Venus has long been a puzzle. There is strong evidence that there used to be water on the planet, and there is enough deuterium in the atmosphere to support that premise, but the oxygen appears to be gone. Unlike Mars, it hasn't been converted into oxidizing metals on the ground. Instead, Venus has been shooting its oxygen off into space. At least, that's what measurements from the European Space Agency probe indicate. Venus turns out to have an unusually strong electrical field compared to that of the Earth, with the result that any time an oxygen atom is ionized, the electrical field takes hold and shoots it out of the atmosphere. According to NASA's Glyn Collinson, "If you were

unfortunate enough to be an oxygen ion in the upper atmosphere of Venus, then you have won a terrible, terrible lottery. You and all your ion friends will be dragged off kicking and screaming into space by an invisible hand, and nothing can save you." Kudos to NASA for the image of anthropomorphic atoms, but remember, in space, no one can hear oxygen scream...
