Special Orders of Business:

Today was the birthday of several people involved with SF, and a movie.

The author of note is Eric Flint, was born near here in beautiful downtown Burbank. He got his fiction start by winning the Writers of the Future contest, at the age of 46, and sold his first novel at the age of 50. He has since written or co-written a ton of SF, fantasy and alternate history stories. Averaging a couple of books a year.

This is also the anniversary of the release of an...um... unforgettable science fiction movie. **Zardoz**, starring Sean Connery and directed by John Boorman, who also did **Deliverance**, came out on February 6th, 1974, leaving audiences baffled ever since. Legendary reviewer Roger Ebert said of the film: *Every once in a while, a movie like that comes along; a movie you've got to see so that you, too, can be in the dark about it.*

Most prominent passing of interest to fans is probably Kirk Douglas, who died at the age of 103. While he may be best remembered for things like **Spartacus** or **Gunfight at the O.K. Corral**, he actually did a number of SF and fantasy projects, including **20,000 Leagues Under the Sea**, **Saturn 3**, **The Final Countdown**, an adaptation of **The Odyssey**, and a TV adaptation of **Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde**.

Patron Saints:

Patron Saint Mike Glycer, winner of 11 Hugos, seven for File 770 and four for fan writing. Chaired the 1978 Westercon and the 1996 Worldcon. When he was fan GOH at a Deep South Con in 1981, he had to convince people there that the LASFS minutes he wrote were based on real stuff. He and his wife Diana were separately nominated for Hugos in 2008, one of the few times that a couple have been nominated *separately* in the same year. Marty pointed out that File 770 is the major news zine of fandom.

Patron Saint Albert Sheean: Christian said that Albert has done "under the radar" stuff for conventions, like logistics. He has built furniture, is an amateur astronomer and paleontologist. Krystal mentioned that his daughter is also named Crystal.

Patron Saint Frank Waller: He used to cosplay as Harcourt Fenton Mudd. George said that Frank is a "good Joe". Christian mentioned Frank's support service to the club.

Reading of the **Minutes** of the previous meeting: Christian bid \$3 to name the minutes Phredd, based on the suggestion from Albert.

LOSCON 47: Scott was here and reported that the price goes up in April, so buy your membership in advance. Gregory Benford, writer GOH, Jeff Sturgeon, artist GOH, Dennis and Christine Cherry as fan GOHs.

Science News:

NASA has finished building the core of the SLS [Space Launch System], which is part of the return to the moon. The star Betelgeuse has always been a bit variable, but is now only half as bright as normal. It is a candidate for nova explosion, but scientists are arguing.

February 18th will be when Mars is occluded by the moon. According to an article in the new issue of **Science** magazine, there may be an actual mechanism that causes forgetting. In tests with mice, scientists have established a link between a type of immune cell called microglia and the loss of traumatic memories. Apparently, if you remove the microglia or stifle their activities, memories stick around longer. Effectively, in a way that is still being investigated, the microglia break the synapse link which stores what makes up a memory. It has not yet been demonstrated in humans, but the brain chemistry is similar enough that it is being investigated.

Also, scientists at Caltech are working on a new form of cancer therapy. Basically, the theory is that most cancer cells can be killed by a form of pulsed ultrasound treatment. The trick is that no form of such treatment is likely to kill ALL of the cancer cells in the treated area, so what they're working on is to have the ultrasound both kill most of the cancer cells and do so in such a way that the body perceives it as an injury, rather than just the natural death of cells. That way, the body would trigger a white blood cell response, which in turn could kill off surviving cancer cells. The project continues at Caltech and City of Hope.

Scott Beckstead announced that Jupiter may have started out as a rocky, terrestrial planet that kept adding stuff. Anton Petrov's website WhatDaMath published this information.

Science News:

Scientists have been examining the flourishes and motions that chefs use in various forms of cooking, and it turns out that they really do matter. After studying pizza tossing and the pan-tilting used in making crepes, they've turned their attention to fried rice. Cooking it at the hottest temperature really does require tossing the rice up into the air repeatedly, in such a way as to move the rice around for when it comes back down. Otherwise, you'd have to reduce the cooking temperature to prevent burning, which changes the taste and texture of the dish. The down side is that cooks who make a lot of fried rice get what appear to be repetitive motion stress injuries in their shoulders.

Also, it appears that bats can harbor viruses that are deadly to other species, but without getting sick themselves. The reason, apparently, is that at least some species of bats have a really impressive immune system that allows them to be infected by viruses without getting sick from them. The problem is that a disease has to be really strong to even exist in a bat, so there's a "survival of the fittest" thing going on with the disease virus strains. That is why diseases like Ebola, Marburg, and the more recent coronaviruses can exist in bat populations without killing off the bats, but be so dangerous to other species, like humans. For obvious reasons, scientists would love to figure out how to get humans to have a similar immunity, but the drawback of housing viral pools with an unknown potential for mutation into something else has been the source of a number of SF and horror novels, and for good reason. (*Of course, if scientists can get humans to acquire similar immunity to viruses which bats have, we will all have to then sleep whilst hanging from tree branches by our toes.* - ed.)

Hare mentioned that he was called back to UCLA to be a guinea pig again. They connected him up to a set of brain and heart-monitoring devices, and asked him questions. He hopes they will tell him more at the end results. (*So you were a guinea pig again, eh? Did they put you in a wheel you would spin to generate electricity for the experiment?* -ed.)

Special Orders of Business:

It is the anniversary of the birth of writer **James Churchward**, whose pseudo-science books about lost continents directly inspired stories by H. P. Lovecraft, Philip K. Dick and Daniel Pinkwater, among others.

Of birthdays, the other one of note is that of **T.A. Waters**, whose career included being a magician, being an author both of books about magic and of fantasy stories, and of being a character in other people's stories. He's in the Lord Darcy stories by Randall Garrett as "Sir Thomas Leseaux," and in Michael Kurland's *The Unicorn Girl* as "Tom Waters."

We note the passing of writer and artist Nick Cuti. From the 1970s until just recently, he worked in writing or illustrating for comics, books, animation, novels based on his own comics creations, and just about anything else. He worked at Warren as a writer and editor during Forry's years there. At one point he decided to illustrate for books and magazines, and studied the works of a fellow named Frank Kelly Freas to figure out how to do that. His illustrations appeared in *Analog*, *Amazing Stories* and *Heavy Metal*.

We also note the passing of a prolific writer of alternate history and SF stories that were overlooked by fans because they were marketed as mainstream thriller novels. Clive Cussler died at the age of 88, and three of his adventure series took place in an alternate world in which Atlantis was established as being historical fact and characters used technology that would have made the Mission Impossible agents drool. He also blurred the boundaries of real and fictional life by appearing as a character in several of his own books, and by having one of his series be about a secret agency related to his real-world underwater archeology organization.

Also, we lost a woman of note, at the age of 101.

Katherine Johnson, one of the women portrayed in the film *Hidden Figures*. In her home town, African Americans were not given public education past 8th grade, so her family got her transferred to a high school in another county. She graduated high school at the age of 14, and graduated college *summa cum laude* at the age of 18, in 1937. She was one of the first African American students, and only woman among that small number, admitted to West Virginia University's grad school, after court decisions told them to put up or shut up on the "separate but equal" doctrine. She left grad school when pregnant with her first child, and the events in *Hidden Figures* take place more than fifteen years after that. She spent five years working for the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, the predecessor of NASA. So, there was a lot that the movie left out. What the movie did tell, correctly, was that she was a math whiz who could analyze orbital data faster than almost anyone, and that the astronauts came to rely on her numbers.
