Moments of Science

- Nick Smith: In 1859, an indigenous wooly dog named Mutton died, the last member of a Native American breed. His pelt was sent to the Smithsonian Institution, and only recently, scientists looked at its genetic information. The study of Mutton's gene structure is being used to find out why and how the breed died out.

- After debating whether he had time to do so, Lyn Maners shared two related stories. There's a signal of Australian aboriginal DNA that showed up in the Amazon. A precursor to those people who had that gene in between didn't pass those genes on. It wasn't a matter of close contact.
 - O About 900,000 years ago, there was a genetic bottleneck among humans. The entire population of the ancestors of Homo sapiens was down to 1,280 individuals. That sounds like a tremendous bottleneck. That was based on sampling from sites largely in Africa, so it might have been that particular group's genetics, not the entire group of ancestors.
